

OAK Airport Expansion Plan Would Expand Pollution, Sickness, Traffic, Noise February 2024

People in Oakland and the East Bay appreciate Oakland airport (OAK) for its convenience and manageable size. Programs to address disproportionate health and environmental impacts on residents of East Oakland are in the works.

But now Oakland and the East Bay are threatened by a so-called "modernization" proposal from the Port of Oakland that is really an unnecessary and environmentally harmful expansion. It does little to address health impacts, greenhouse gas emissions and other pollution, traffic or noise effects.

The Port Must Go Back to the Drawing Board, Listen to Public Input and Revise Its Plan!

Details on the Expansion Proposal

The Port released its plan in 2021 and then published a Draft Environmental Impact Report

(DEIR) in July 2023. It would increase the number of gates by 55% (16 new gates), pulling in more passengers and traffic. It also calls for extensive new and unnecessary facilities construction. What it does not do is include "mitigation" measures to reduce pollution and health effects, in line with federal and state climate goals.

Public comments filed in October 2023 by citizen groups, government agencies and the City of Alameda, blasted the report, saying it does not meet basic legal and technical requirements. "All in all, the Airport expansion project hurts far too many groups, from adjacent East Oakland communities to airport workers and communities under flight paths."

Stop OAK Coalition Comments on the Port's Draft Environmental Impact Report

Harmful Impacts of the Current Plan

- MORE greenhouse gas emissions
- MORE asthma, heart disease and other health effects for the people of East Oakland
- MORE traffic, noise and emissions
- MORE noise over flight path areas in Oakland, Alameda, San Leandro and Berkeley

Who Would Pay for Expansion and Who Would Benefit?

The Port has not released a budget or a financing plan for this expansion. But it would likely include tax dollars intended for sustainable transportation projects that would reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Southwest Airlines shareholders and construction companies would benefit.

"We recommend that the EIR include a comprehensive analysis of the public health impacts of the Proposed Project, such as a Health Impact Assessment."
